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Fishing Tips....





Striper Fishing

Guest Speaker: CAPT Herb Gordon


Conditions:

Stripers can be caught in any conditions, most often fishing the tidal current and/or light lines from the bridges yields the best results.

Technique:

Casting: When casting on the bridge pilings position the boat close to the pilings and cast up-current to allow the lure to flow with the current near the pilings. Looking for a light strike on the lure while lure is sinking. A light strike will be better felt on a Conventional/Baitcast Reel than on a Spinning Reel.

Wirelining: Capt Gordon advises "It costs a lot to learn how to Wireline". Wirelining requires a different approach in targeting Rockfish and is more challenging than other methods. Trolling wire over the tunnel tubes begins in shallow water and moves deep. The object is to continually bounce your sinker atop of the rocks covering the tube and allow your long leader to drift over the tube with the current. The sides of the buildings on the bridge tunnel islands are often used as the alignment for your trolling course. When you hang up on the rocks (and you will) it's important to break the sinker off as quickly as possible. Capt Gordon has a small piece of leather mounted on his reel (lower right photo) that he uses with thumb pressure on the wire spool. Generally, this is enough tension to break the lighter weight mono and retrieve the rig.



Tackle:

Casting: Windcheaters used at dawn or dusk works well around the pilings

Wirelining: Conventional Reels (Penn 330) with shorter rods and line guides to handle #65 wire. 3-Way swivels are used to attach the #65 wire, #60 monofilament drop (4ft) to sinker, and 30ft of #50-60 Leader. Only 1/4oz Bucktails are necessary as the sinker weight keeps the lure down. Trolling speeds vary on conditions but 2.5-3.5 kts across the current is typical.

Trolling: Capt Gordon uses White and Chartreuse Parachute rigs attached to the same 3-way swivel. He keeps the Parachutes rigs weighted the same (9oz) and differs leader lengths (5ft and 10ft) to keep rigs from

entangling. Use your fishfinder to find the depth of the schools and adjust rigs and speed accordingly. Capt Gordon favors the Parachute rigs from Spankin Stripers, specifically 34081D with a 10/0 Mustad Hook. Rigging the tails requires some practice to position the rubber swim tail correctly, especially if you're rigging a second "stinger" hook.

Other thoughts: Capt Gordon shared his perspective on the decline of Rockfish over the last decade, most dramtically in the past two years. He shared that he's observed a slow decline over the last ten years fishing the Chesapeake Bay and there's a number of contributing causes. Both Commercial and Recreational fishing take their toll on the fishery as does other environmental factors. Water quality and the availability of bait fish influence our fishery. "Stripers follow the bait"

On October 29, 2014, the Atlantic States Marine Fishery Commision (AMFC) voted to establish a spring recreational Striped Bass trophy permit and the Virginia Marine Resource Commission (VMRC) will hold a Public Hearing on the issue in December. The AMFC action requires each state to decide how best to achieve their revised harvest limits.

Anglers are encouraged to provide their input to VMRC by attending the Public Hearing or drafting a letter to the Commission. See the Angler's Interest page for additional information.













A Great Day on the Water with Friends! By James Short, owner of HRFP

I had the pleasure of fishing with Louis Glaser and Bert Sainz today. We met up at 8 am and got away from all the other boats around the high rise. After moving north on the Elizabeth River for awhile, we started marking fish holding deep in the river. The water temp was 54 degrees and the fish were down in the warmer water. The lures that worked best for us were jigs with plastics. Louis began hooking up pretty quickly and continued the clinic for the next four hours. At the end of the day we had all caught fish and had 12 trout and one striper in the box.



16 Nov: JT Hale was fishing with me. We ran out to some wrecks of VA Beac, really calm day. We had a two person limit of sea bass to 4.5 pounds and 11 triggers to 3.5 pounds. This was JT's biggest sea bass he ever caught.





I also ran my boat out to some wrecks in the 60 mile plus range off VA Beach and limited out on sea bass to 4.5 pounds and nice catches of trigger fish. Some of the triggers were almost 4 pounds. Have heard of good flounder catches



on some of the closer wrecks.

19 Nov

Hamish Small was fishing with me. Prior to this trip the only trout he had ever caught were some no bigger than 10 inches fishing for other species. We caught 12 this day with 4 between 24.75" and 26" and Hamish had 3 of the four biggest. All were tagged and released except for one 22 incher Hamish kept.







The Basics of Cold Water Safety

When planning a fishing trip we think about all the things to make the trip successful. There's all the rods & reels, fishing tackle, bait, fuel for the boat, food & drink, and the list goes on. And, while we'll give a thought to the outside temperature and dress for it, seldom do we consider how cold the water is and what it means IF you find yourself in it.

1 - 10 - 1 is the US Coast Guard's Cold Water Survival Rule and it helps to understand the phases of cold water immersion. Simply put it's <u>1</u> (first minute and Cold Water Shock), <u>10</u> (Ten minutes and Cold Water Incapacitation), and 1 (One hour to succumb to Hypothermia).

1 - The first minute and Cold Water Shock

Rapid immersion in cold water causes the body to gasp and hyperventilate. The risk of breathing in water during this initial and uncontrolled phase is high and accounts for roughly 20 percent of deaths from drowning.

10 - Cold Water Incapacitation

The next ten minutes is critical for a person in the water to self-rescue. As the body decreases blood flow to the arms & legs to preserve body heat to vital organs you lose meaningful arm & legs movements. Your ability to self-rescue diminishes and if you're not wearing a Personal Floatation Device (PFD) that will float you head up, you drown.

1 - Hypothermia

Hypothermia is the cooling of the body core temperature. It happens more slowly that you might imagine and varies among individuals depending on a number of factors such as, physical conditioning, body fat, etc. Hypothermia symptoms can range from confusion to unconsciousness and develops in the hour after immersion.

So, how cold does the water have to be? Well, our fishing grounds are already cold enough at 49 degrees (CBBT water temperature on 28 Nov). Though generally, water colder than 60 degrees is considered cold.

There's another Coast Guard Rule to think about...the 50/50/50 Rule; In 50 degree water for 50 minutes you have a 50 percent *better* chance of surviving wearing a Personal Floatation Device (PFD).

It's important to remember if you've gotten dunked you must get dry and warm as soon as possible. Toughing it out because the fishing's good can spell disaster. Hypothermia can quickly become a medical emergency. Calling the Coast Guard on

VHF Channel 16 is one of your best options for getting assistance quickly.

VMRC Public Hearing on Proposed Amendments to Striped Bass Regulations



December 9, 2014: REQUEST FOR PUBLIC HEARING: Proposed amendments to Chapter 4 VAC 20-252-10 et seq., "Pertaining to the Taking of Striped Bass" to comply with Addendum IV to Amendment 6 to the Atlantic Striped Bass Interstate Fishery Management Plan. The Commission voted unanimously to advertise for a December 9, 2014, Public Hearing for proposed amendments to CHAPTER 4 VAC 20-252-10 ET SEQ. "PERTAINING TO THE TAKING OF STRIPED BASS" to include any measures adopted and approved, relative to Virginia Striped Bass fishery management, by the ASMFC Striped Bass Management Board on October 29, 2014; and to establish a spring recreational striped bass trophy permit and sanctions pertaining to the failure to submit mandatory harvest reports for spring torphy striped bass.


