RecFish

Earlier this year, we told you about the RecFish app being developed by Dr. Lisa Kellogg and colleagues at the Virginia Institute of Marine Science. Its goal is to encourage recreational anglers to collect and contribute catch data to help improve fisheries science. Once it's fully developed, the user-friendly, free app will also tell anglers the species and length of their catch and whether it is legal to keep and safe to eat.

Dr. Kellogg says that, with the help of photos you submitted, the computer model can now identify 60 fish species with 95% accuracy and another 20 species are in the works. That represents thousands of submitted pictures!

You can help by going to www.recfish.org and uploading your fish photos. RecFish especially needs photos of:

- Kingfish (a.k.a. Roundheads, Kingcroaker, Whiting, Sea Mullet)
- Flounder and other flatfish

Phase 2 of app development is almost complete, and, when it is, you will be able to use the app to upload your fish photos directly from your phone. Until then, keep those pictures coming at www.recfish.org!


Fishing Tips...

<u>Spanish and King Mackerel Fishing</u> <u>with Captain Todd Beck, Knot Wish'n Custom Charters</u>



Spanish Mackerel are a great fish to target in late spring and throughout the summer. They're fun to catch and you don't have far for travel to get on them. "Capt Todd" shared, he's takes charters out of Rudee Inlet in his 23 foot Parker Center Console and quickly setup for trolling while heading south of the jetties. Generally, you'll troll about 5 knots speed with four fishing lines out in around 20 feet of water. Along the oceanfront isn't the only location to find them, he added, many anglers will also troll the Chesapeake Bay and around the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel.

A typical trolling setup includes four rods, two for each side of the boat. Capt Todd prefers using a levelwind reel like the Penn Squall for a number of reasons. First, they're easy to use and retrieve the line evenly on the spool without any additional effort on the part of the angler. Second, the levelwind line guide can be used to consistently set the distance of the lure behind the



boat. Knowing how much line each pass of the guide represents and counting the passes from one side to the other an angler can determine how much line is deployed. This is important when using planers in shallow water. Generally, planers will dive deeper with more line out and may strike the bottom. Knot Wish'n Charters prefers to set the planers at a depth of about 8 feet on what they call their short lines. They also run lures on in-line sinker further behind the boat on their long lines. Depending on vessel speed and the in-line sinker weight, they can set the lure to a target depth between 2-3 feet. Whether it's planers or in-line sinkers, the lure of choice is the Clark



Spoon, size 0 or 00 in gold and silver finishes. The leader from the planer or sinker is 15 feet of 25# monofilament line. Capt Todd shared, fluorocarbon fishing line is nice but it's not needed for this application. He recommends setting up with different color

Clark Spoons on each side of the boat. If the spanish mackerel prefer one color over another be prepared to switch all the lure to the same. Because the spanish mackerel target the small silver colored bait fish and strike hard when they find them Cap Todd recommends painting your planers a dark color (photo right). He's experienced mackerel striking the metal planer as it's trolled by and lost rigs when their sharp teeth cut the line.

He shared trolling speed for spanish mackerel is about 5 knots. Occasionally you'll start catching small bluefish along with mackerel. To avoid the bluefish he increases speed. Spanish mackerel have no problem chasing a lure over 5 knots. Capt Todd also shared when you see a spanish mackerel slam your lure at the surface and hook up, don't stop to reel it in. When you stop or slow your lures will sink to the bottom. Spanish mackerel swim in schools and where there's one there's more. Keep your troll going and keep fishing!




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Fishing Tips...

Though spanish mackerel and king mackerel are both "mackerel", they're fished very differently. While spanish mackerel are trolled at 5+ knots with spoons, king mackerel are usually fished with live bait and very slowly (1 knot) however, fast trolling lures are also an option. Capt Todd's preferred bait is live menhaden but spot, croaker, and small bluefish are also good bait choices. Rigging for king mackerel involves using wire leader material to prevent the mackerel from biting off your bait. 60# and up to 90# multi-strand wire leader is used and tied with a figure 8 knot. Another difference fishing for king mackerel is levelwind reels are not generally used. Once a king mackerel hits they can make a blistering run and peel line off a reel at a surprising pace. The best choice of reel are the open spool reels that can dispense line quickly and cleanly. Take care when retrieving the line to evenly lay it back on the spool and prevent "high centering". Try to select a 2-speed reel with heavier drag settings. Capt Todd likes to use a 30# monofilament mainline with a 60# monofilament "topshot" to connect to his wire leader. The heavier monofilament line makes handling easier and is less likely to break a fish off alongside the boat.





Depending on live bait size Many anglers will also rig a "stinger hook", which is a second treble hook either trailing behind and alongside the bait or lightly hooked into the back of the dorsal of the bait. King mackerel are known for biting off the tails of their prey before coming back around to devour the entire fish. Using a trailing "stinger hook" may increase the number of hook ups. Capt Todd stressed not to troll the live bait too fast, it needs to swim as naturally as possible and use care to not place a stinger hook where it will interfere with the fish.

For artificial lures, using this same rig an angler may replace the live bait with a larger L.B. Huntington spoon (photo below) trolled about 25-50ft back. The Huntington spoons come in silver, gold, and other colors with/without reflective color accents.

There's also the option to use a lipped lure like the one shown right. This particular lure comes with a tandem hook vice treble hooks and like any king mackerel rig they should be rigged with a wire leader. Capt Todd will position this lure close to the boat & propwash off the corner of the transom.

Thursdays; July 6th, July 20th, August 3rd, August 17th



Fishing Reports...

10 JUN: I loaded my family in the boat and headed to the Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel (HRBT). My Parents, Brother, and Nephew were in town from Florida. Using frozen shrimp and cut Mullet on dropper rigs, we fished just east of Fort Wool to find a steady bite of small Croaker, Whiting, and Flounder. Once the incoming tide began to slow down, we moved in between the HRBT bridge spans and continued catching Croaker. The highlight of the trip was Mom's 13 inch Cobia which we photographed, tagged, and released for the Virginia Game Fish Tagging Program. Water temperature was 68-69 degrees. - Alex Perez









10 JUN: Took a run to the Chuckatuck for striper. I caught a 23 inch on a stretch. The tide had just changed to incoming. I rarely fish incoming tide. Based on my lack of results this year, it may be time to change,

3 JUN: I was picked from a lottery of VBAC members for this trip on Havoc Charter's HAVOC 2. The boat was the Ocean Pearl that Captain Brandon Baldwin bought from Steve Wray of Long Bay Point. We boarded at Southall Landings Marina on the Salt Ponds in Hampton. Went to Chesapeake Light Tower which was a 2 hour trip in pea soup thick fog for spadefish. Pretty crowded there. Had to re-anchor several times. Some were catching a few that were positioned close to the tower. I got a 6lb 2oz, a club minimum in and pulled the hook on another. Fish were right on the bottom. When we finally figured it out and got in closer to the tower the wind blew up bad. Only two others on the boat were caught. That boat is a smooth riding boat for rough seas like we had heading back. The CLT was just too far a trip for that boat.

8 JUN: I got invited to go again to the Chesapeake Light Tower for spadefish this time with Scott Payne on his friend Pete Ansten's 24 foot center console Sea Hunt. We left out of Lynnhaven Marina and made the CLT in less than an hour making 30-35 mph in pretty calm seas but again the tower was slammed with 20+ boats already. We could see decent sized spades getting caught close in to the tower where most people were. Most had trolling motors on with Spot Lock holding their positions. It took us a while to get anchored in a good position when I caught the first spade, a 5lb fish. Soon after that I caught my big one at 7lbs 3ozs a club minimum on my scale verified at Long Bay Point as well. Pete caught a nice one too but we didn't weight it. The a major thunderstorm with lightning pulled in the area soaking us so we headed home in 3-5 foot waves. Well that's all I'm doing at the CLT. Hopefully they will be a the CBBT soon in better weather.

The smoke in the air from the Canadian wildfires was so thick you could barely see a half a mile, but we made it out to the Chesapeake light tower in good time. We were fishing with clam on an one ought red gamakatsu hook and one split shot 12" above the hook. I tried the cheaper eagle claw

Black Sea Bass Season Mid-Season Closure July 7th-August 8th





Black Sea Bass season will be closed from July 7th through August 8th for the midseason closure. The mid-season closure was necessary to account for an ASMFC directed harvest reduction and the Virginia February season. When the season opens on August 9th it will remain open through the remainder of the year.

Striped Bass (Rockfish) Regulation Changes





At their June Commission meeting the Marine Resources Commission voted unanimously to amend Chapter 4VAC 20-252-10 Pertaining to the taking of Striped Bass to change the maximun size limit for Striped Bass for the Virginia Coastal Season, Chesapeake Bay Fall Season, and the Potomac River Tributaries Summer/Fall seasons from 36 inches to 31 inches in Total Length (TL).

VMRC Announces Voluntary Recreational Cobia Initiative for 2023 Season



The Virginia Marine Resources Commission voted at the February 28th Commission Meeting to replace the Recreational Cobia Mandatory Reporting Program with the Voluntary Recreational Cobia Initiative. This initiative has been

developed by VMRC staff to begin collecting voluntary length and age data from recreational cobia anglers to help assess the health of the stock. This initiative will take effect starting with the 2023 cobia season and taking part in this new initiative is not required to be able to recreationally fish for cobia.

VMRC is looking to collect the following length data from any recreational anglers:

- released cobia under 40 inches
- cobia over 50 inches if a 50-plus inch fish has already been harvested
- cobia caught after the daily allowed bag limit has been reached,
- cobia caught pre- and post-season.

Recreational anglers can submit cobia release length data through the Virginia Saltwater Journal (https://www.vasaltwaterjournal.com/). If you are an active fish tagger in the Virginia Gamefish Tagging Program (https://www.vasaltwaterjournal.com/report_tagged_fish.php), please only submit length data through the tagging program and not through the Virginia Saltwater Journal. The length data submitted through the tagging program will be pooled together with release length data collected from the Virginia Saltwater Journal.

To properly record length data, anglers will measure cobia with the ruler stretched straight underneath the center of the fish, the fish's mouth should be closed, and the length will be measured to the tip of the pinched tail. Lengths should be recorded to the nearest possible measurement without rounding, while recognizing the goal is a live and healthy release. Release length data should be submitted through "Voluntary Recreational Reporting" in the Virginia Saltwater Journal, and we encourage everyone to submit length data by the end of the calendar year.

CVOW Fisheries and Mariners Update

June 2023

As our offshore work on Coastal Virginia Offshore Wind (CVOW) continues, we remain committed to maintaining communications with fishing communities and other mariners in the area via these periodic updates as well as dock visits, informational speaking engagements and additional information posted on the CVOW website.

All mariners are encouraged to contact Dominion Energy's Fisheries Liaisons below with any specific questions about CVOW project activities in relation to fisheries.

Recent announcements include:

The UXO identification work is underway with the *M/V Subsea Responder I* and the *M/V Subsea Responder II*. These vessels utilize Remotely Operated Vehicles (ROVs) to investigate targets identified by the previously conducted survey activities and determine if they are UXO. This operation will begin in the nearshore cable corridor (Area A) and continue offshore through Area B and then into the Lease Area (Area C). These vessels will not be towing any survey equipment and should not pose a hazard to any fixed-gear commercial fishing operations. These operations are expected to continue into the fall of 2023 and any targets confirmed to be UXO will be shared via the USCG 5th District Local Notice to Mariners.

Mariners transiting or fishing in the operational area are requested to provide a 0.5 nautical mile-wide clearance to survey vessels, which may be limited in their ability to maneuver. Mariners should operate in a manner that will not endanger themselves, the survey vessel or its equipment.


CVOW and Fisheries Resource Surveys

In partnership with the Virginia Institute of Marine Science (VIMS), Dominion Energy is conducting resource assessment studies for Black Sea Bass, Atlantic Surfclam and Channeled Whelk in the project area.

Black Sea Bass: The study consists of 8-strings of ventless traps with 6-traps per string. Sampling once per month with a 48-hour soak utilizing acoustic release buoys to recover gear. Randomly selected sampling sites will be inside lease with control sites area outside lease area. Sampling will begin in June 2023 utilizing the VIMS R/V Bay Eagle.

Atlantic Surfclam: With support from Rutgers University, the commercial F/V Joey D will sample 20-stations inside lease and 20-stations outside (40-sample tows in total). The work will take place June 18 and June 19, 2023 and will take 2-3 days to complete; sampling stations are shown in the chart below.

Channeled Whelk: Study design is complete and sampling gear is being acquired. This is a cooperative study that plans to utilize commercial whelk fishermen and their vessels. Fishermen interested in participating should contact the Dominion Energy Fisheries Liason.

- Minimum Size Limit: No size limit
- Recreational Bag Limit: 50 per person; additional 50 live bait per customer capacity on for-hire or charter vessels



Kingfish

- Minimum Size Limit: No size limit
- Recreational Bag Limit: No bag limit



Grey Trout (Weakfish)

- Minimum Size Limit: 12 inches
- Recreational Bag Limit: 1 per person



Bluefish

- Minimum Size Limit: No size limit
- Recreational Bag Limit: 3 per person from shore or a rented or private vessel
 5 per person on for-hire or charter vessels



Spanish Mackerel

- Minimum Size Limit: 14 inches
- Recreational Bag Limit: 15 per person



King Mackerel

- Minimum Size Limit: 27 inches
- Recreational Bag Limit: 3 per person



Cobia

- Minimum Size Limit: 40 inches
- Recreational Bag Limit: 1 per person or 2 per vessel, whichever is more restrictive. Only 1 fish per vessel may be greater than 50 inches total length.
- Season: June 15 September 15
- Gaffing prohibited



Summer Flounder

- Minimum Size Limit: 16 inches
- Recreational Bag Limit: 4 per person



Striped Bass

Any person fishing striped bass recreationally shall use non-offset, corrodible, non-stainless steel circle hooks when fishing with bait.

Chesapeake Bay Spring Season

- Size Limit: 20-31 inches (Recent Change)
- Recreational Bag Limit: 1 fish per person
- Season: May 16 June 15

Chesapeake Bay Fall Season

- Size Limit: 20-31 inches (Recent Change)
- Recreational Bag Limit: 1 fish per person
- Season: October 4 December 31

Coastal Season

- Size Limit: 28-31 inches (Recent Change)
- Recreational Bag Limit: 1 per person
- Season: January 1 March 31, May 16 December 31
