



Fall Social 2025



27 SEP: I went fishing on the *Rudee Angler* with several of the guys from Tidewater Anglers Club. It was a surprisingly calm day on the water. Everyone on the boat caught their limit of sea bass with the largest one being 3.56 pounds. Unfortunately, I don't have video proof but I did win the money for largest fish caught in the fish pool. On the way back we got into some dolphin fish but unfortunately, the people fishing for them were unable to land any. All in all, it was a great time! Too bad I wasn't able to make it to the fall social.

11 SEP: Cold, wind & rain can't deter the Chuckatuck crew. John Curry, George langdon & I headed to the mouth of the Chuckatuck on John's boat to check on the bite. Well the bite was very slow. We landed a few small Specks which were tagged & released. We fished minnows & paddle tails.

18 SEP: I was invited to fish with Henry & Mary Troutner and John Curry aboard The Troutner's 20ft Shamrock Sea Duck. We departed the Huntington Park boat ramp in Newport News mid-morning to fish along the James River Bridge for Black Drum. After few days of storms and heavy rain the water was pretty dirty and the James River not so settled. The first fish in the boat was a barely over slot striped bass which was quickly released, followed up by a nice 27" black drum. We kept the first black drum and agreed to tag any others. Mary landed a nice 37" black

drum and we tagged and released it. Needless to say we all caught our share of oyster toadfish off the bridge pilings and rocks. It was a great day fishing with my fellow Norfolk Anglers!

30 AUG: I launched from the Willoughby boat ramp and fished the Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel (HRBT) island from Fort Wool side to the tunnel project conveyor belts. Using 2.5 inch Gulp minnows or chartreuse curly tail grubs on a 1/8 ounce jig head, I worked the shoreline with only a small Gag Grouper being caught.

I decided to make a run into the Elizabeth River, just past the Navy base to Norfolk International Terminals (NIT). With the tide switching to a flood, I worked the pier on the North end of NIT, the rocks by the water treatment plant, and both Piers 1 and 2. Still using the 1/8 ounce jigs, I steadily picked through medium Spot and Croaker, two Red Drum in the 17-18 inch range, and a Bluefish in the mid 20 inch range.







The following day I fished with Dan Moore and returned to NIT to fish the end of the outgoing tide, through slack, and the beginning of the incoming tide. As the flood tide picked up speed, using chartreuse 3 inch Gulp Swimming

Mullet on 3/8 inch jig heads, Dan had the hot rod catching Flounder up to 17 inches,

just over slot sized Red Drum, and a confirmed

small Stone Crab. - Alex Perez







20 SEP: I ran to Norfolk International Terminals (NIT) to break in my brand new 7 foot Bransom Special medium-light rod paired with a Canyon Reels Backwater 2000 reel.

Using 2.5 inch Chartreuse grubs on a 1/8 ounce jig head, I fished the middle of the outgoing tide and caught four Speckled Trout to 19 inches and a Red Drum at 29 inches. All fish were tagged and released for the Virginia Game Fish Tagging Program (VGFTP). - Alex Perez







3 SEP: John Curry invited Mary & I for an early morning trip up the James River. We left his dock at 6:30AM to catch high tide and fish the shoreline above the JRB. The James River never ceases to amaze me with the verity of fish we catch. Today, using Minnows, Crab and Z-Man paddle tails we caught 3 small Stripers, 4 Flounder, including a 19" keeper, a couple small Specks, a Houndfish, a Lizardfish, White Perch, and a 3' Cow Nose Ray. I've been surprised at the number of Flounder and small Stripers we've caught this year so far up the river.

23 SEP: Bert and I went fishing with Louis in Little Creek for whatever would bite. At the end of the trip, that wasn't much. 2 keeper Speckled Trout and a few small ones were hooked. The current was light and the wind was over 10 mph. But it was great to be out on the water with my fishing buddies.

12 SEP: The ugly weather finally broke. Mary, John Curry, George Langdon & I headed out in the Shamrock to the JRB to check on the Black Drum bite. We fished from 9AM to noon, catching the last of the outgoing current and some of the incoming. The first few drops resulted in Toadfish but then the Blacks moved in and took over. Mary hooked the 1st one but it broke off when it ran under the boat. Shortly after that I landed a 34". We continued to hook up with Blacks, all in the 35" range, landing 3 and loosing 4 or 5 for one reason or another. We also landed a small Striper. Bait was live crabs. All the Drum were tagged and released. Note: By time a Black Drum is landed it is pretty much totally worn out. When releasing we spend several minutes reviving them, than using a lip clamp keep them in the water tied to the boat until they are kicking to be released.

24 SEP: The Speckled Trout have finally shown up in quantity if not quality. John Curry invited George Langdon & I to fish with him today. We started at the MMBT to see if any Black Drum were around. We struck out there and after an hour we headed up the Nansemond to try for Speckled Trout. We caught a half dozen but the bite was slow and headed in. On the way we made a stop at the mouth of the Chuckatuck. There we ran into a pretty big school of small Specks. We were catching a fish every third cast or so and landed 30+ Specks, 10"-161/2". Though small we had our ultra light tackle so lots of fun. Gotta love when they attack a jig 2-3-4 times on the retrieve. We even had a couple Flounder sneak into the bite. All fish caught on plastic jigs and were tagged & released.

8 SEP: The wind just won't give us a break but, David Mitchell (Marty Schriebl's neighbor) has the solution to keep fishing. Dave invited me for a day on the Black Water River in his canoe, which is about as big a boat that will float where we fished. The Black Water runs through thick woods providing cover from the wind and a beautiful land scape. This fresh water paradise holds large numbers of Largemouth Bass, Bowfin, & Bream, with Pickerel, Gar & Catfish making an appearance. We fished casting "Zoom Baby Brush Hogs" on a worm hook behind an 1/8 oz

bullet lead, and a couple different topwater lures & buzz baits and never went more than a couple cast without a strike. We caught 28 fish; mostly Largemouths, about a half dozen Bowfins, a NAC citation Pickerel and a couple Bream.


